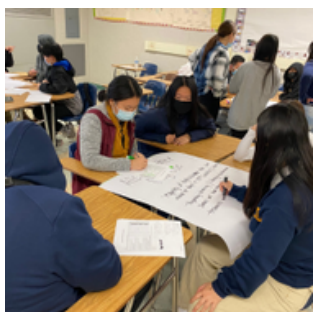
2,622 YOUTH SERVICE

EBAYC served 2,622 unduplicated youth through its integrated programs and services for young people and their families in Oakland and Sacramento.



Expansion of Violence Prevention Services

EBAYC doubled the number of Counselors who provide life coaching, case management, and family engagement with youth who are at the center of community violence, exploitation, and incarceration. EBAYC now serves 150 youth each year.



Sacramento Children & Youth Health & Safety Act of 2022

EBAYC, as part of the Sacramento Kids First Coalition, won voter passage of Measure L - Sacramento Children & Youth Health & Safety Act of 2022. Measure L requires the City of Sacramento to set aside 40% of all cannabis business tax revenue each year for youth substance, mental illness, violence, and homelessness prevention services.



Building a Healthy San Antonio Neighborhood

EBAYC convened the San Antonio Neighborhood Coalition to address serious quality of life challenges in the neighborhood. The Coalition, whose core members include Trybe, Parent Action Research Team, Friends of San Antonio Park, St. Anthony's Catholic Church, and Garfield Elementary School, organized hundreds of residents to win the installation of traffic diverters on East 15th Street to stop open-air sex-trafficking; garnered \$4 million from the City of Oakland to renovate the children's playground and complete a feasibility study for a new public library and community center in San Antonio Park; and got the City of Oakland to secure housing for unhoused individuals living in the encampments around Garfield Elementary School.
